## How have you been impacted by the ongoing atrocities in your home country?

In Syria, its a land of unfulfilled promises. High living costs, lack of electricity, and essential rights are deprived. The struggle continues everyday with uncertainty for the future.

Looking ahead, what changes would you like to see on a legal and social level that support migrants' experiences and protect longterm belonging and stability in Qatar?

Urgent need for legal protection for migrants. Stable jobs, income, and support during crises are extremely important. Laws should protect against exploitation and have a safety net for those facing financial and emotional problems.
